#### OVERVIEW

Still, the highlight remains St-Anne Canyon, a steep gorge that the relentless force of water has carved out of a 900-million-year-old rock formation. Here, you will make your way to the roaring St-Anne-du-Nord River, which becomes a thundering waterfall in the canyon. You might even walk along the suspension bridges above the water, if you are feeling adventurous. To enhance the experience, you may follow a nature trail into the forest. Next, you will visit an award-winning Canadian vineyard to learn about local wine making and sample a selection of distinctive wines. Despite the harsh winters and short growing seasons, Quebec vineyards produce surprisingly tasty wines.

More natural beauty lies ahead at Montmorency Falls, which explorer Samuel de Champlain named for his patron, the Duke of Montmorency. It is a memorable tribute, as the cascades are 90 feet higher than Niagara Falls. The views are equally stunning from the restaurant Montmorency Manoir, where you may enjoy tea and pastries, before crossing the bridge to the Island of Orleans. Here, you will visit Sainte-Pétronille, a village that has been a fashionable summer resort since the 19th century. Later, you will learn how maple syrup is made and sample sweet maple taffy at a sugar

shack.

#### OVERVIEW

Pass Quebec City's historical and contemporary landmarks and then venture into the countryside to a thundering waterfall that is 90 feet higher than Niagara Falls. As you drive through the city, you will see the square that was at the heart of the area's original settlement and Dufferin Terrace, where explorer Samuel de Champlain built a fort in 1620. A bit of free time follows, during which you may visit the iconic and somewhat more modern hotel Château Frontenac. Once out of downtown, you will visit Cap Diamant, the promontory overlooking the Plains of Abraham, where the French and British battled in 1759. After stopping for photos and to enjoy the sweeping views of the St. Lawrence River and Laurentian Mountains, you will head for Montmorency Falls. It is quite a sight, as the cascades thunder down 275 feet into the river. As a lasting tribute to his patron, explorer Samuel de Champlain named the falls for the Duke of Montmorency.

Stops will be made to sample some characteristic wines, jam shop and traditional nougat.

You will also see a 19th-century pulp mill that helped spur development throughout this part of Canada.

- Gain an understanding of the 1996 flood that caused widespread devastation in Saguenay.
- See a whimsical pyramid-shaped art installation that commemorates the flood.

French colonists lived side by side with First Nations tribes such as the Hurons, and you will also visit a re-creation of their village, along with a rural farm and Quebec City's upper and lower towns. Interacting with the characters at New France, watching folkloric Indian dances and sampling traditional foods add even more to your understanding of 17th-century life. For a glimpse into the natural world, you will browse the Saguenay Fjord Museum. Its displays explain in detail how the waterway was formed and its importance to the province.

OVERVIEW

Discover how local artisans make cheese, blow glass and weave alpaca wool using time-honored traditional techniques. Your immersion into these crafts will include the family-owned Fromagerie Boivin, where you will see how a variety of cheeses is made and then sample a selection of them. One of the most popular items is a cheese curd that squeaks when you chew it. You will enhance your understanding of glass-blowing at the Touverre Workshop as the craftsmen demonstrate how to manipulate glass into creative shapes. You may also learn about the materials needed to produce glass and the history of glass-blowing. Similarly, at the Alpaga Bersi farm, you will see how craftsmen skillfully weave alpaca wool into sweaters, hats, scarves, and other clothing. Unlike sheep's wool, alpaca wool doesn't contain lanolin so it is hypoallergenic.

- Sample a variety of cheeses that are produced using traditional techniques.
- Watch glass-blowers manipulate molten glass into all sorts of useful and creative items.
- See how alpaca wool is woven into clothing with the added benefit of being hypoallergenic.

OVERVIEW

Paddle a kayak along the smooth-as-glass waters of the Saguenay Fjord, looking for seals and other marine life in the unspoiled wonderland. After a scenic drive, you will arrive at the Saguenay National Park, the first park in the province dedicated to protecting marine life. You will then ease into a two-person kayak and start paddling along the shores of Cape Trinity. Receding glaciers carved the waterway out of rock centuries ago, leaving behind sheer cliffs and one of the province's most spectacular settings. Seals and marine birds are also prevalent in the pristine Cape Trinity area, so be sure to scan the waters as you paddle along. Afterwards, you might shop in the interpretation center.

Its fjord, deeply chiseled in the Laurentian Mountains, is one of the world's largest and was discovered by French explorer Jacques Cartier in the mid 1530s. Arriving at the Fjord Museum, you will discover how the waterway was formed, its importance to the province, and why the museum's strange Ha! Ha! Pyramid monument was created out of more than 3,000 traffic yield signs. Then a self-guided visit will be made, at the historic old paper mill, which is a National Historic Site of Canada, located in a partially forested valley on the Chicoutimi River. The pulp mill once belonged to the Compagnie de Pulp de Chicoutimi, which mechanically transformed wood into paper pulp to meet the demand of European markets at the beginning of the 20th century. Since summer 2002, following major renovations, La Pulperie de Chicoutimi opens its doors to the public and offers artistic and ethnologic displays on the history of the locals inhabitants. Finally, you'll visit Le Chevrier du Nord, a farm that raises angora goats for mohair clothing. It's quite the enterprise and a memorable end to your tour before driving back to the pier.

Gain a firsthand understanding of life in a small Greenland town on this guided Narsaq walk that includes mingling with the locals at a fish market. The heart of Narsaq is a scenic collection of brightly painted buildings bordered by two fjords. While archeological evidence – including an entire Viking longhouse unearthed under a kitchen garden – confirms the area was occupied since Viking times, modern Narsaq is technically Greenland’s youngest town. Established as a trading colony in 1830, it took till 1959 for the population to finally break 600 and achieve official town status. During the walk, you’ll stop in at the Narsaq Museum where some of that history is presented. While locals here have hunted seals and raised sheep and cattle in the past, the primary mainstay today is fishing. But the biggest new boon to the economy is found in the mountains looming behind town: precious metals and rare, semi-precious tugtupite, a stone prized for its deep-red fluorescent color. The town shops offer jewelry made with this gem, its name derived from Intuit for “reindeer blood.”

The newer section was built following an avalanche in 1995 that destroyed almost all of the original town. At the Arctic Fox Center, a research facility and museum dedicated to the only indigenous land mammal in Iceland, you will learn about the foxes and perhaps see injured ones being rehabilitated. You will also visit a small wooden church that was moved to its present location from Hesteyri when that village was abandoned in the 1950s. After listening to a stirring performance of traditional Icelandic music at the church, you will drive along the neighboring fjord, pausing at a memorial to the victims of the avalanche that struck Súðavík.

crew get into all kinds of adventures after entering a passage into the earth on Snæfellsjokull Peninsula. Your expedition down into Vatnshellir will be much the same, but with better ventilation – and no dinosaurs. The lava tube entrance is a scenic hour’s drive from the pier, along a rugged coast and majestic volcanic landscape. Equipped with helmet and flashlight, you’ll follow your guide through an above-ground entry capsule and down into the cave’s upper section, lined with fascinating lava formations along its sides. A long, narrow passage and spiral staircase lead ever deeper until you reach the cave’s lower section, a completely soundless chamber with black igneous walls. Once there, all lights will briefly be turned off so that you can experience true total darkness. Expect your sense of smell to become heightened as your brain lets go of sight and sound. Then it’s back up to the surface, with new perspective.

- Settle in for a drive across the one-of-a-kind Snæfellsjokull Peninsula landscape by panoramic coach.

You’ll see their nests on the precipitous rocky cliffs and surely spot puffins resting on the water between dives for the tasty small herring they love to eat. Your guide will share fascinating facts about the lifestyle of these charming birds during the excursion.

Any photograph taken with this cascade in the foreground and Kirkjufell soaring to the heavens behind can’t help but be a winner. In fact, photographers and filmmakers from all over the world come to Grundarfjordur just to capture this image. On the return walk, you’ll want to check out the fishing boats in the charming harbor, the church, and the homes built by the town’s French founders.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Explore the picture-perfect fishing village of Grundarfjordur on foot and catch the perfect picture of its surrounding landscape.
- Ascend a hill overlooking town for spectacular vantage point on the Snæfellsnes peninsula scenery.
- Trek to the spot where idyllic Kirkjufellsfoss waterfall cascades in multiple streams with iconic Mt. Kirkjufell as its backdrop.
- Photograph this scene of incomparable natural majesty, as so many famous photographers have.

Here you’ll board the ferry and head into Breidafjordur Bay, which is encircled by mountains and dotted with volcanic islands that are havens for nesting seabirds. As you sail through whirlpool currents, passing dozens of islands with strangely beautiful rock formations and basalt columns, you can expect to spot a

variety of species. Puffins, eider ducks and shags are commonly seen, as are kittiwakes. These handsome black-legged gulls typically nest on narrow cliff ledges, perched facing the wall with tails stuck out over the edge. You might also catch sight of magnificent white-tailed eagles diving to pluck fish straight from the sea with their razor-sharp talons. These waters also teem with marine life, even occasional seals. As if to prove this abundance, your captain will at some point cast a net overboard to haul in a bounty of seafood. Some of it can be eaten raw as so-called Viking sushi, and you’ll have a chance to sample. Nothing could be fresher.
