OVERVIEW

You could be offered a chunk of fried eel or a bite of Belfast bap, a hearty sandwich typically loaded with Irish bacon, scrambled eggs and cheddar cheese. Continuing on to other foodie locales, you might try a few spoonfuls of colcannon, a mixture of mashed potatoes, cabbage, cream and butter. Of course, potatoes appear in all sorts of classic dishes such as Irish stew, Ulster fry and boxty, a tasty potato pancake.

Add 21 towers and 3 gateways to that tally – and that’s before we even discuss the mass of the castle itself. Although partially in ruins, enough of the castle remains intact to create a dramatically atmospheric vision as it overlooks the River Conwy. Following your castle tour, wander the village’s ancient cobbled streets at your leisure or join the guide for a half-hour walking stroll. Either way, you’ll almost believe time travel is possible.

The structure is nearly symmetrical and has two “walls within walls” encircling it – a radical architecture for the time, which even today presents a formidable appearance. Following the castle tour, a short stroll leads to a nearby hotel where coffee and cakes await. After that, a guided walk through historic Beaumaris village precedes the drive back to Holyhead.

looks. In a country with over 600 castles, it seems like every aspiring family wanted to have one. And the wealthy Pennant family was no different. So, in 1837 they moved into Penrhyn, their freshly built Norman-style castle that looks like something straight out of the Elizabethan era. Arrayed on 100 acres of prime coastal parkland, it's the object of your tour today – and there's quite a lot to see inside. Now owned by National Trust, the interiors retain the lived-in look of a 19th-century residential castle. The style is richly gothic with a distinctly Moorish flavor, and the home's substantial collection of old masters and family portraits is considered the finest in Wales outside Cardiff's National Museum. A recently restored Victorian kitchen and domestic rooms add further interest to your visit. The grounds are also an impressive example of classic estate living; discover their formal gardens, semi-wooded walks and a Victorian walled garden at your leisure following your guided tour of Penrhyn's interior.

- Enjoy a scenic drive across Anglesey and along the Menai Strait with Snowdonia's peaks as backdrop.

As you will see, the coast is dotted with villages, small coves and unusual rock formations such as London Bridge, a natural limestone arch that juts into the sea. Marine life thrives in these waters, especially harbor and grey seals. These two species are easy to tell apart because grey seals are larger and have longer sloping heads. It is likely that you will also spot bottlenose dolphins zipping through the water and even leaping into the air. They are highly intelligent and often use clever techniques to capture prey. For instance, you may see them working together to herd fish into groups for more efficient feeding.

OVERVIEW

Spend hours exploring Exeter with no schedule to follow, which allows you to concentrate on the attractions that sound most appealing to you. Exeter evolved from a Roman-British center into a medieval cathedral city and is now the county seat. The landmark Cathedral Church of Saint Peter makes a great starting point for sightseeing. Its Gothic façade is incredibly ornate, and its nave features the longest stretch of medieval vaulting in the world. Other options for exploration include the Royal Albert Memorial Museum & Art Gallery, the serene Rougement Gardens and the burrow of underground passages that brought fresh water to Exeter in medieval times. Sections of the original lead water pipes are displayed nearby. The quayside is a wonderfully vibrant area for shopping and dining.
