### KTN-067 PRIVATE SALMON FISHING IN KETCHIKAN

#### OVERVIEW

OVERVIEW Go deep-sea fishing with a captain and crew that know the prime fishing grounds and the best methods to catch plenty of salmon. Although countless species inhabit these waters, Ketchikan is the Salmon Capital of the World, so there is no better place to catch these highly prized sportfish. Once you reach a spot where the fish have been biting lately, you will begin trolling for salmon using a downrigger to ensure that the bait reaches the desired depth. All the fishing tackle is provided so you can just concentrate on landing a big one. Five species of salmon are found in this part of Alaska, including king salmon, which are also called Chinook salmon. Pink salmon are the most abundant species and they are vigorous fighters. If you want to keep what you catch, it can be processed and shipped anywhere in the United States. Of course, be sure to snap lots of photos first.

#### HIGHLIGHTS

- Fish for hard-fighting salmon in a small group of not more than six people.
- Enjoy the stunningly beautiful, natural backdrop of the Tongass National Forest.
- Ship your catch home fully processed if you want to eat it later.

### KTN-068 PRIVATE HALIBUT FISHING

#### OVERVIEW

OVERVIEW Try your luck fishing for halibut, a species of flatfish that gets massive and feeds voraciously in the summer. You will head out to the fishing grounds in a group of no more than six guests, which ensures that the captain and crew can provide exceptional personal attention to increase your chances of catching one of these behemoths. Once the boat anchors, you will fish with a vertical rigging to reach the bottom of the ocean floor where halibut live. The larger fish are usually females and can grow up to eight feet in length and five feet in width, which is why they are often called "barn doors." Imagine what a thrill it would be to reel in one of these lunkers. If you catch one, you will notice that it has smooth scales and a light-colored bottom and a darker top, which acts as a natural camouflage that mimics the hues of the ocean floor and water.

#### HIGHLIGHTS

- Fish for halibut on a private boat with just five other guest's maximum.
- Follow the crew's advice and tips to increase your chance of catching a huge halibut.
- Ship your catch home fully processed if you want to eat it later.

We recommend doing this in advance at [adfg.alaska.gov](http://adfg.alaska.gov) Guest may also purchase them on the boat with cash as payment. Weather appropriate clothing and comfortable walking shoes are recommended. Guest may keep all legal fish caught on the trip. This season guided anglers may keep one halibut per person, per day, that must be under 40" or over 80" We also catch other species and guest may retain all legal fish in addition. We work with a 3rd party fish processor called Gateway Smokehouse and Processing. We will facilitate delivery of the catch to them after the trip. Credit card info is needed for fish processing. We have the processing forms onboard our boats. While on the Private Halibut Fishing tour each guest will hold their own rod. We spend approximately 4 hours fishing with an additional 1.5 hours of roundtrip travel time to the fishing grounds. Each guest will need to purchase a one-day sportfishing license.

A comfortable pace will be maintained as you thread your way around steep curves, climbing to a height that will present unparalleled views of the Tongass National Forest, Behm Canal and the Inside Passage. Stops will be made along the way to soak up the grandeur and natural beauty. Drivers and passengers will have the opportunity to switch positions. Be sure to watch for wildlife the entire time, as eagles, deer and bears are frequently sighted.

- Drive an off-road kart through a private rainforest preserve.
- Pause at overlooks to marvel at the incredible scenery.

You may be able to see a totem pole that is in the process of being created and explore a collection of clan houses that depict how the native people lived in the 1800s. Although it may seem an odd complement, there is also a collection of antique cars at the park.

Once you reach the prime fishing grounds, a deckhand will supply you with fishing gear and you will troll for salmon using a downrigger. Anglers will rotate from rod to rod, so that everyone has the same amount of time on each one. Five species of salmon live in these waters, including king salmon, which are also called Chinook salmon. Pink salmon are the most abundant species and they are vigorous fighters. If you want to keep what you catch, it can be processed and shipped anywhere in the United States.

During king salmon season, you must purchase an additional \$15 tag. If you decide to process your catch and ship it home, you will need a credit card. Fish can only be shipped within the United States.

**KTN-028 RAINFOREST ZIP, SKYBRIDGE & RAPPEL ADVENTURE**

**OVERVIEW**

Envision the thrill of gliding through the top of a rich rainforest canopy along a series of nine ziplines and a cable suspended between tall spruce, hemlock and cedar trees, all bordering the magnificent Tongass National Forest. This eco-adventure combines the rainforest canopy with a flight over nine ziplines and 4,500 feet of high-tension cables, one aerial bridge At Herring Cove, an all-terrain custom 4x4 Unimog will transport you up a steep rain forest hillside to the canopy chalet. Professionally trained guides will outfit you with the state-of-the-art safety equipment and provide a detailed orientation before you mount the first platform. Your rain forest canopy challenge features a 'flight' over nine zip-lines. Your guide will progressively ease you into the forest canopy along cables ranging from a short 100 feet up to 750 feet. Eagles and bears are often seen from the platforms. Cross a hanging bridge offering breathtaking views of the forest below. You will be up to 135 feet above the forest floor. Throughout this adventure, you are surrounded by the sights and sounds of the rain forest wildlife preserve. The final zip-line emerges from the rain forest and transports you over lush grassy wetlands to a viewing tower, 55 feet above where you will rappel to the ground. Time permitting, grab a freshly brewed coffee or a cold Alaskan beer and explore our Tsimshian totem park, see a master carver working, check out our historic sawmill and watch our local blacksmiths at work. Stop by the General Store to see photos taken during your zip-line experience and to shop for mementos of your Alaska adventure. Your excursion concludes with a scenic drive back to the ship.

OVERVIEW

Soar through the treetops on a series of ziplines and rappel down some of the towering platforms in between for the ultimate adrenaline-pumping adventure. Even the trip to the zipline course will be thrilling as the last leg will be in an all-terrain 4x4 Mercedes Unimog. After warming up with a test run, you will climb the first platform, harness onto the zipline and step off into thin air. You can expect every second of the ride down to be exhilarating as gravity pulls you through the forest canopy at a heart-racing speed. Each zipline offers a different panoramic view of the wilderness, which includes woodlands, mountains and the sea. You may also catch sight of a bald eagle flying overhead. Back on solid ground, you can see eagles up-close at the Alaska Raptor Center. You will also have the chance to browse a collection of totem poles and a historic saw mill.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Fly through the forest canopy on an exhilarating zipline course.
- Rappel down wooden platforms between the ziplines.
- Enjoy spectacular views of the surrounding natural beauty.
- Look for bald eagles in the wild and see them up-close in a raptor center.

OVERVIEW

Stand on an elevated platform that presents excellent views of a stream where black bears and other wildlife are often spotted feasting on salmon. To reach the platform in Herring Cove, you will follow a naturalist along a trail that winds through tall stands of hemlock, spruce and Alaska cedar. This pristine environment is home to black bears, eagles, seals and other species that feed on the more than 100,000 salmon that come each year to spawn. The elevated platform presents an excellent vantage point to view the wildlife up close. It will be quite the sight as some salmon will be caught while others will make it farther upstream. Later, you will watch injured birds of prey rehabilitating at the Alaska Raptor Center, tour a historical sawmill and see a master artisan carve a totem pole.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Observe black bears feast on spawning salmon.
- Look for other wildlife such as bald eagles and mink.
- See birds of prey up close at a rehabilitation center.
- Watch a totem pole being hand-carved.

HELPFUL HINTS

**KTN-049 SEA CYCLE OCEAN ADVENTURE**

OVERVIEW

Pedal a pontoon-style Sea-Cycle around the estuary at Ward Cove as the guide describes the scenic beauty and area history. Each two-person Sea-Cycle boat allows for leisurely pedaling yet leaves your hands free to snap photos of the surrounding natural wonders. There is plenty to view, especially when passing Tongass National Forest, the largest such protected landscape in America. The dense forests of red cedars, hemlocks and Sitka spruces will seem to go on forever. Along the way, the guide will elaborate on how many Alaskans still subsist on food and medicines that they harvest from the woodlands and sea. Be sure to keep an eye out for eagles soaring overhead and seals and bears along the shore. Ducks are among the most prevalent animals in the tidal estuary. Ward Cove is noteworthy for being the site of Alaska's first pulp mill and home to one of the area's most productive fish canneries.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Pedal a two-person Sea-Cycle boat around the estuary at Ward Cove and along the sea.
- Take in the natural beauty of Tongass National Forest, America's largest such landscape.
- Look for indigenous wildlife such as bears, eagles and seals.
- Learn about the history of Ward Cove and how it once fueled Ketchikan's economy.

HELPFUL HINTS

- Dress in weather-appropriate clothing.
- Wear flat, comfortable, non-slip shoes.

This tour is not available to guests who utilize a wheelchair. Those guests with mobility concerns are cautioned to evaluate their personal level of ability and stamina. Guests will be outfitted in rain gear (weather permitting) and issued a life jacket prior to going down to the pier. Guests should be able to navigate a steep ramp due to tidal variations. A safety briefing will be conducted on the pier and then two guests share a sea cycle, both sides equipped with pedals to propel the pontoon style watercraft. Guests will need to pedal for approximately 3.5 miles at a leisurely pace. Guests who go ashore do so with the understanding that they will be mixing with members of the general public. Maximum combined weight is 550lbs.

As you will discover during the initial briefing, the electric-enhanced bicycle will boost your pedal power, allowing you to ride farther and negotiate hills with considerably less effort than with a conventional bicycle. It's only about three miles to the Connell Lake, all of it staggeringly beautiful. Sitka black-tailed deer are commonly seen along this route. The flora is also exceptional, especially the carnivorous sundew plants that consume insects that they trap on their sticky pads. Upon reaching the lake, you will learn how it was created in 1952 by damming several creeks to provide millions of gallons of freshwater to the Ketchikan pulp mill. The dam continues to feed water to different resources throughout the community even after the pulp mill closed more than 25 years ago. Before pedaling back, you can relax around a campfire under a canopy of coniferous trees or walk a short nature trail.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Pedal an electric-enhanced bicycle to and from Connell Lake, a roundtrip of about six miles.
- Gain a historical perspective of the manmade lake, which once provided millions of gallons of freshwater needed to operate the Ketchikan pulp mill.
- Learn about the indigenous flora and fauna from the naturalist guide.

HELPFUL HINTS

- Dress in weather-appropriate clothing.
- Wear flat comfortable walking shoes.

PLEASE NOTE

Minimum height 5'0. Minimum age 12 years old to participate. Weight limit is no more than 275 lbs. This tour is not available to guests who utilize a wheelchair. Guests will bicycle a total of approximately 6 miles roundtrip on an e-bike that has both pedal assist option and a throttle assist for a very easy ride. Guests should be comfortable riding a bicycle. The trail is a mix of gravel and forest ground and may include muddy portions. The nature trail is a mix of boardwalk, gravel, and forest floor. Guests who go ashore do so with the understanding that they will be mixing with members of the general public.

OVERVIEW

Paddle a two-person kayak across the calm waters of Connell Lake, a manmade reservoir that the Tongass National Forest surrounds. Following a briefing to help you maximize the experience, you will ease into a kayak and follow the guide around the lake. This beautiful body of water was created in 1952 by damming several creeks to feed millions of gallons of freshwater to the Ketchikan pulp mill. The 60-foot concrete dam still exists and continues to supply water to resources throughout the community. Today, Connell Lake is known more for its spectacular natural beauty, which you will see up-close as you paddle along the forested shore of America's largest national park. Unusual flora and fauna abound, which the guide will describe as you paddle around the lake to several hidden wonders.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Kayak across naturally beautiful Connell Lake, all of which the Tongass National Forest surrounds.
- Gain a historical perspective of the manmade lake, which once provided millions of gallons of freshwater needed to operate the Ketchikan pulp mill.
- Learn about the indigenous flora and fauna from the naturalist guide.

- Dress in weather-appropriate clothing.

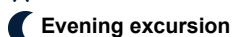
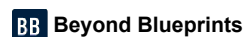

bubble-netting. Be sure to ask the biologist about the details or anything else that comes to mind. Bald eagles are also commonly seen all along the shore of the Tongass National Forest, which covers most of Southeast Alaska.

They might fish recreationally, go mountain biking and play golf at Muskeg Meadows, one of the first courses in Southeast Alaska. You too will experience Wrangell's natural beauty on a short hike through the rainforest, while the guide describes the flora and fauna. Feel free to ask any questions that come to mind such as how kids occupy their time and how life changes in the winter.
