#### OVERVIEW

Drop by a family-owned farm that grows tomatoes year-round and breeds horses, an unusual enterprise that makes for a fascinating experience. You will see more natural wonders at Geysir, a geothermal area with dozens of hot springs and geysers, and at Gullfoss, a glacially fed roaring waterfall. Both demonstrate the sheer power of nature. Farther inland, you will find Fridheimar, a farm that uses artificial lighting to grow organic tomatoes in greenhouses. The tomato varieties range from heirlooms to sweet gourmet piccolos, whose seeds are imported from Provence. The tomatoes are exceptionally tasty as you will discover while enjoying a tomato-based lunch in one of the greenhouses. Later, you will watch sure-footed Icelandic horses display their five gaits. These unique smallish horses are descended from ones brought to Iceland more than a millennium ago.

and the Reykanes peninsula stretching out to the south. If it is a clear day, you can spot glacier-capped Snæfellsjokull volcano in the distance. Being so close to Reykjavik, Mount Úlfarsfell is a popular hike and you will likely encounter quite a few other people on the trail. If you see purple-tufted wildflowers along the trail, they are probably arctic lupines.

OVERVIEW

Hike through the hardened Búrfellsgjá lava channel that formed in the wake of a volcanic eruption 8,000 years ago and behold the geothermal activity that continues today. The eruption left fissures in the earth and a gaping volcanic crater, which you will reach by following a moderately challenging trail to the summit. From there, you will gaze out over the ancient lava field, which the guide will describe in fascinating detail. In time, you will drive on to view Kleifarvatn, the peninsula's largest and deepest lake, even though the water level fluctuates as much as 13 feet. Locals claim to have spotted a Loch Ness monster-like serpent there. Another photo stop will be made at the active geothermal springs at Krysuvik and Seltún, a cauldron of boiling mud pools and hissing steam vents. It will be quite the sight as mineral deposits have colored the surrounding terrain shades of red, green and yellow.

After Hafnarfjörður, a city built on an ancient lava flow, every mile traveled grows more dramatic. A stop at Kleifarvatn Lake presents a striking photo op and a chance to spot the Nessie-like serpent believed to inhabit its 300-foot depths. At the hyperactive Krysuvik geothermal area you'll walk along a wooden boardwalk past boiling mud pools and hissing steam vents, amidst terrain stained bold red, green and yellow from mineral deposits. Excellent views of lava fields and the ocean shore are available from a nearby hill; they could almost be of another

planet's landscape. Unexpected hues show up again at Green Lake, a deep dish of seafoam-colored water sitting inside a dormant volcano crater. The setting is more heavenly than hellish at lovely wooden Strandarkirkja Church, a place that Icelandic seamen have prayed for centuries. Speaking of which, the flavor of that lobster lunch at a coastal restaurant will feel like a prayer, answered.

Board a ferry for a cruise through the prime birdwatching habitats of Breidafjordur Bay, and enjoy a taste of fresh-caught “Viking sushi.” Your archipelago adventure begins with a drive to Stykkisholmur, a quaint coastal town on the Snæfellsnes peninsula. Here you’ll board the ferry and head into Breidafjordur Bay, which is encircled by mountains and dotted with volcanic islands that are havens for nesting seabirds. As you sail through whirlpool currents, passing dozens of islands with strangely beautiful rock formations and basalt columns, you can expect to spot a variety of species. Puffins, eider ducks and shags are commonly seen, as are kittiwakes. These handsome black-legged gulls typically nest on

narrow cliff ledges, perched facing the wall with tails stuck out over the edge. You might also catch sight of magnificent white-tailed eagles diving to pluck fish straight from the sea with their razor-sharp talons. These waters also teem with marine life, even occasional seals. As if to prove this abundance, your captain will at some point cast a net overboard to haul in a bounty of seafood. Some of it can be eaten raw as so-called Viking sushi, and you’ll have a chance to sample. Nothing could be fresher.

Over 100 years old, this dot-sized green oasis in the midst of the badlands proves what can be grown this far north. Another curio you'll encounter is the old shark-fishing town of Flateyri, perched on a spit of land projecting out into Onundarfjordur fjord and boasting a current population of about 200. You'll take a guided stroll along main street and into the life of this mountain-surrounded outpost, entering an intimate little church where you'll be treated to an Icelandic music program, and visiting the old bookstore that doubles as the village museum and archive. You'll also have a chance to observe some town women at work in their handcraft workshop and to share a coffee break and chat with the Flateyrites.

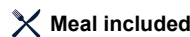
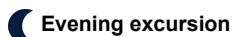
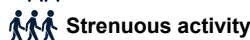

One of the country’s foremost 20th-century artists painted the altarpiece at a nearby church. Still, few sights compare to Hafnarhólmi, a birdwatcher’s paradise. The observation platform will afford you an excellent view of nesting puffins, fulmars and kittiwakes; the latter being loud gulls named for their nasal “ki-ti-waak” callnotes.

Then into the old town center with a selection of souvenir shops and the well-known "Rainbow Street". Taking a few minutes to explore that area on our own. From the town center we walk onwards around the estuary lake in the middle of the town along the main road enjoying the visual experience of the local houses intermingled with more recent artwork before heading back to the ship.

Kirkjubøur was among the first areas settled in the Faroes and became an important religious and cultural center in the Middle Ages. The imposing ruins of the 13th-century Saint Magnus Cathedral stand as a reminder of that period, and as you will see it still dominates Kirkjubøur. You will gain a different historical perspective at the turf-roofed Roystova Farmhouse Museum,

The wood is supposedly driftwood from Norway as there are no forests in the volcanically formed Faroes. The same family has occupied the farm for 17 generations.
