gives Cork its distinctive continental flair. Modern day Cork is a University City, brimming with jazz, film, opera, theaters, restaurants, and all of the amenities of a large city, yet it still manages to retain the pleasant charm and friendliness of a country town. During your drive through Cork, you will see some of the city's famous sites, including St. Fin Barre's Cathedral, the Old Courthouse, City Hall, and the renowned Bells of Shandon. OVERVIEW

OVERVIEW

Explore the history and beauty of Cork during a walking tour through this wonderful old city. Historic Cork is a city of steeples and bridges and was truly made for walking. Although its compact size makes it entirely visible from many vantage-points, this charming city offers an abundance of lovely Old-World sites for you to discover. Cork extends out through the hills that rise up on both sides of the Lee River, and its quays stretch all the way into the heart of the city. Cork's city center is actually a small island situated between two channels of the river and a plethora of bridges, and features streets lined with numerous shops, arcades and boutiques. A drive through the rolling countryside, takes you to Cork's city center where you'll begin your walking tour. Walk down the South Mall, one of the most gracious streets in the city. Cross the Parnell Bridge and enjoy the views and photo opportunities of City Hall, the bank, College of Commerce and Morrison's Island. As your walk continues along the quays, the slender spire of the Holy Trinity Church can be seen across the river. Stop at the Parliament Bridge to admire its gracious arch and gleaming limestone. As you approach the South Gate Bridge, the three spires of St. Fin Barre's Cathedral, part of the city's skyline, suddenly come into view. Stop for a visit of this ornate church, designed and built by William Burgess. Stroll down Sharman-Crawford to Clarke's Bridge, a beautiful stone structure dating back to 1776, and continue to Cork's bustling main thoroughfare. The classical limestone façade of the Courthouse, located in a street full of red brick buildings, is one of Cork's most enduring sights. A walk down North Main Street and Castle Street takes you into the heart of this cosmopolitan city filled with pedestrian lanes, cafes, bookshops and antique shops. Enjoy some free time at the nearly 400-year-old English Market. A popular location for both residents and visitors, the English Market offers a unique shopping experience that should not be missed. Alternatively, you can use your free time to explore the area independently and perhaps do a bit of shopping before rejoining your coach for the return drive to the ship. Please note: This tour includes approximately 2.5 hours of significant walking, at times on uneven ground, inclines and there are steps to be negotiated. view even the far corners of the waterway, which is the world's second-largest natural harbor. The drink will be fortified with locally distilled Jameson Irish whiskey and topped with fresh whipped cream.

Film buffs will also enjoy seeing the Ashford Castle Hotel, another backdrop for the movie. Although a hotel since 1939, the castle dates to the 13th century.

OVERVIEW

Behold western Ireland's rugged landscape above and below the surface by driving through The Burren and exploring the depths of Aillwee Cave. The Burren reflects an Irish word for "rocky place" and true to its name the region is covered with exposed limestone terraces. However, The Burren isn't barren. The majority of Ireland's indigenous plants flourish there, making the landscape look like an endless rock garden. It is hauntingly beautiful, especially when the flowers are in bloom. The Burren is also home to Aillwee Cave, which melting water from the Ice Age carved out of the limestone mountain. Once the headquarters of the MacDonnell clan, the castle was abandoned after part of it fell into the sea during a violent storm in 1639. Recent excavations have revealed the remains of an adjacent town from that period. According to legend, giants strode across the columns over the sea from Scotland, giving way to the causeway's name. Founded in 1090 and once the Isle of Man’s capital, this proud burg is little changed from how it looked in the 1800s. Perhaps that’s because the town clock has only ever had one hand. Your inside tour of handsome, limestone-walled Castle Rushen takes you even further back in time – to when clammy dungeons and “murder holes” over the ceiling of passageways were the way to make would-be invaders feel...unwelcome. You’ll notice things are a lot more civilized at the well-restored House of Keys, where the Manx parliament convened until the seat of government moved to Douglas in 1869. By the way, the Isle of Man’s 1000-year-old High Court of Tynwald is the longest-running continuous parliament on the planet.

the Channel’s waters from the Hoe. After ambling on past other medieval landmarks and a more modern section of Plymouth rebuilt after heavy WW2 bombing, you can transfer back to the ship or explore a while longer independently.

Fowey absolutely lives up to its designation as one of England's Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Travel by coach on a scenic loop through rural and coastal Cornwall.
- Tour 49-room Lanhydrock House, a country mansion still furnished and organized to strict Victorian standards.

Fishing boats still parade through the harbor as they have since the 13th century, fishermen's cottages crowd the car-free waterfront, fresh seafood appears on every pub's menu, and the shops offer an inspired range of nautical merchandise.

in the 10th century. A stop at the High Moorland Visitor Center will provide fascinating background on the park's wildlife, geology, archaeology and cultural heritage. Later in your journey, another experience synonymous with Devonshire life is on the agenda: a traditional cream tea. The essential ingredient is Devonshire clotted cream, made from Jersey cattle who graze solely in local pastures; nothing else will do. The order of ingredients is also particular. Here in Devon, the cream should be slathered on the scone first, followed by a dollop of jam. Any other sequence is, well, uncivilized.

This tour is primarily panoramic but does include about 30 minutes of easy walking and standing at the Visitor Center.
